"MISS MORRISON AT THE WHEEL" (11) The Manx Music Festival 1911



In 1911, Sophia Morrison entered the Manx Music Festival—the Guild—and that year she won, as she had done once before in 1908, when the class for Traditional Manx Music (Hitherto Unpublished) was first established with the aim of encouraging the collecting of folk songs.¹ Here can be seen the rather magnificent certificate awarded her, though considerably smaller in size than the real object itself. There were seven entries in 1911 from four individuals, multiple submissions seemingly being allowed. Morrison herself entered enterted just the once, as did W.H. Gill. The other entrants, Harry Bridson and Thomas Taggart, were the serial submitters, with two and three entries apiece.² Frustratingly, the titles of the songs

are not given in the official record of the Guild's proceedings for any of the years when the class was running.

However, in this case amongst Josephine Kermode's papers there is a music manuscript in the hand of Sophia Morrison headed "<u>Guild, 1911.</u>" and annotated "Traditional air taken down from the singing of Tommy Quane, March 11th 1911."³ The tune has no title and awaits identification. Thomas Quane was enumerated in the 1901 census as being 43 years old, a Manx speaker, and onboard of the fishing boat *Gleaner*, bound for the spring mackerel fishery at Kinsale off the south-west coast of Ireland.⁴ When not at sea, he lived at 7 Cowley Terrace in Peel with his wife and children.⁵
