1. PEEL CITY GUARDIAN (16 JANUARY 1906)

We share the regret of a very large number of the people of Peel at the departure from our midst of Miss Joughin, daughter of the late Mr J. Joughin, H.K. Miss Joughin is a fervent lover of her native town, and only the call of duty would cause her to sever her connection with it. She is an enthusiastic Manxwoman, and any effort to retain the Manx characteristics and language finds in her a zealous supporter. She will be greatly missed in many ways. The friends who have been so often delighted with her choice company will regret her removal, and the town in many ways will less a good worker. The Wesleyan Church, particularly, will feel her loss. She has, from the first formation of an infant department in the Sunday-school, been its intelligent head, and in church work otherwise has rendered excellent service. To further the teaching of the Manx language, she conducted a Manx class in the Sunday-school, in which some valuable work has been done. She is an accomplished lady, and yet one who made no parade of her knowledge, and we hope that her abilities will find due recognition in her new home, London. We wish both Miss and Mr Harry Joughin a happy and prosperous time. They leave Peel tomorrow (Saturday) morning.
